

## Language focus 1



We often start a conversation by asking a question. There are several kinds of question we can ask.

### A general question

This kind of question is good for starting conversations with people you don't know. These questions are about a general topic and are usually not personal.

Are you enjoying the game? (At a sports game)

Is the food good? (At a party)

Are you going to Osaka? (On a *shinkansen*)

### A specific question

This kind of question is good for starting conversations with people you know. They are often about something you know about the other person.

How was the movie last night?

Are you going to Mark's party tomorrow?

Did you finish your English homework?

### A news question

This kind of question can be used with anyone.

Did you feel the earthquake this morning?

Did you see on the news that there's a typhoon coming?

Did you hear about the tornado in Florida yesterday?

## Language focus 2



Sometimes we start a conversation with a **statement**. There are several kinds of statements:

### General. A statement about something general (small talk)

This kind of statement is good for starting conversations with people you don't know. These statements are not personal. They are about a general topic.

It's so hot today. (Anywhere)

It's a great game. (Watching a sports game)

The food here is delicious. (At a restaurant)

### Personal. A statement about yourself or the other person

This kind of statement is good for starting conversations with friends and people you know. These statements are personal and usually about you, or something you know about the other person.

You look nice today.

I had a great weekend.

I think there's a test today.

### Gossip. A statement about something interesting, unusual, funny, etc., that has happened or will happen soon

This kind of statement is usually used to start conversations with people you know.

You won't believe who I saw yesterday.

I have to tell you what I heard this morning.

I just found out that our teacher has a new girlfriend.
